High Nature Value Farming Awards



Three farms have been recognised in the Tees-Swale: Naturally Connected High Nature Value Farming Awards. The presentation was made by Sir John

Lawton, chair of the Tees-Swale project board, last November.

Ray and Sue Ridley of Kexwith Farm, near Marske, were awarded the Best Practice category for their continuing enhancement of the farm, which has never been intensively managed, and its habitats. Ray and Sue said: "We are very excited that Kexwith should be recognised by the judges as being worthy of this award."

Charlie and Gina Parker, of Hill Gill Farm, Baldersdale, were the winners of the Nature Recovery category for their ongoing transition from a previously intensely farmed holding, and also the continuing care in what has been planted. Charlie Parker said: "We're very pleased and proud to receive the award, thank you to everyone concerned."

Jemma and John Clark of Bowlees Farm, Newbiggin-in-Teesdale, won the Public Engagement category for the volume of public engagement they have achieved since their classroom went in earlier this year. Jemma Clark said: "The recognition inspires me to continue to pursue my passion with even greater enthusiasm."

Reducing pollution from abandoned metal mines



The first phase of two innovative projects to reduce metal pollution from abandoned lead and zinc mines near Middleton-in-Teesdale has recently been completed. The measures, which include building 300m of new riverbank walls and sowing an array of grass and plant species on metal-contaminated land, will limit metals being washed out of mine waste material and polluting Little Eggleshope and Great Eggleshope becks, both tributaries of the River Tees.

The two projects, with funding from the Water and Abandoned Metal Mines (WAMM) programme and The National Lottery Heritage Fund, are helping to improve water quality and restore, expand and connect habitats in the North Pennines National Landscape.
